Head Start in California



The Mission

Head Start and Early Head Start give children from at-risk backgrounds from birth to five years old the skills they need to be successful in school and life — supporting more kids, families, and communities on their path to success.

Head Start is Different

More than early learning. Head Start is a *poverty intervention program* focused primarily on health, designed by health experts to

ensure that children reach kindergarten healthy and ready to learn.

Comprehensive services. Head Start provides vision, dental, and hearing screenings; immunizations; mental health supports and nutrition services in addition to early education. Designed as a two-generational approach, Head Start supports parents with information about important developmental milestones, guidance on family self-sufficiency goals, job assistance and more.

Federal to local. Grants go directly to agencies from the Office of Head Start, so state legislators don't always see Head Start.

The Investment in California

\$1,000,000,000+ in Head Start funding each year.

25,000+ staff employed by Head Start.

Coming Challenges

The shift of 4-year-olds to Transitional Kindergarten could *displace federal funds* with state funds without serving more children.

There is **not sufficient workforce or facilities** for so dramatic an expansion in so short a period of time.

For providers to shift to serve more children aged 0-3 is difficult, expensive and *possibly untenable*. We may lose providers.

LEAs and Head Start programs

LEAs - 40 school districts and 15 county offices of education make up 38% of Head Start grantees and serve 29% of all Head Start children.

Non-LEAs serve *over* 67,000 *children* and account for 61% of all Head Start children served.
